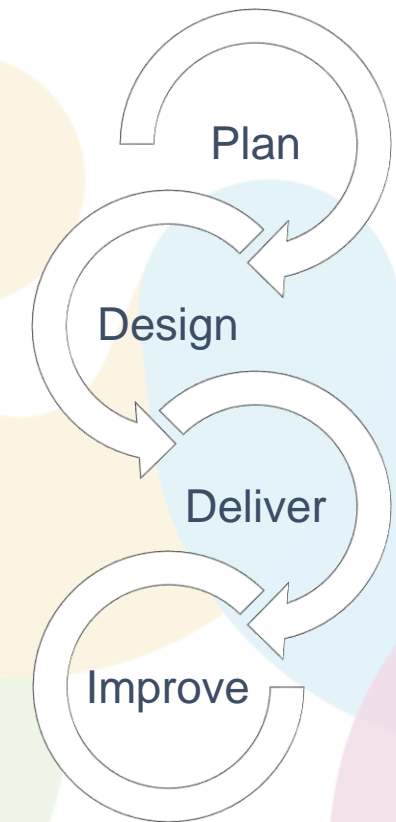

# Health Inequalities Funding



- *Health inequalities are avoidable, unfair and systematic differences in health between different groups of people. There are many kinds of health inequality, and many ways in which the term is used. This means that when we talk about 'health inequality', it is useful to be clear on which measure is unequally distributed, and between which people.*
- Humber and North Yorkshire ICB has received its allocation of the national £200m NHS Health Inequalities programme funding for 2022/23. Some of the funding is being used to deliver a number of priorities at system level including Tobacco Control, Best Start in Life, and Cardiovascular disease.
- In January 2023 we were informed that the ICB is allocating the remaining funds to Place funds from 2022/3, using a Health Inequalities formula.
- The York share of this funding pot is £366,000. The Director of Public Health in each place has been designated the sponsor for the place's fund, and money will transfer to Local Authority budgets before the end of the financial year.

# Health Inequalities Funding



- In York Place we wanted to use the funding to reduce the health inequalities we have in our city, as well as aligning the schemes to our strategic priorities, particularly around:
  - Embedding an early intervention and prevention model
  - Driving social and economic development
  - Meeting the goals of the Health and Wellbeing Strategy
- And around the health inequalities we know we have in York:
  - CVD
  - Tobacco
  - Giving Children and Young People the best start in life
  - Taking forward the Core20Plus5 agenda for adults and CYP

**MATERNITY**  
ensuring continuity of care for women from Black, Asian and minority ethnic communities and from the most deprived groups



**SEVERE MENTAL ILLNESS (SMI)**  
ensuring annual health checks for **60%** of those living with SMI (bringing SMI in line with the success seen in Learning Disabilities)



**CHRONIC RESPIRATORY DISEASE**  
a clear focus on Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD), driving up uptake of Covid, Flu and Pneumonia vaccines to reduce infective exacerbations and emergency hospital admissions due to those exacerbations



**EARLY CANCER DIAGNOSIS**  
**75%** of cases diagnosed at stage 1 or 2 by 2028



**HYPERTENSION CASE-FINDING**  
and optimal management and lipid optimal management



**SMOKING CESSATION**

# CORE20 PLUS 5

Key clinical areas of health inequalities

## ASTHMA

Address over reliance on reliever medications and decrease the number of asthma attacks

2



## DIABETES

Increase access to Real-time Continuous Glucose Monitors and insulin pumps in the most deprived quintiles and from ethnic minority backgrounds & increase proportion of children and young people with Type 2 diabetes receiving annual health checks

3



## EPILEPSY

Increase access to epilepsy specialist nurses and ensure access in the first year of care for those with a learning disability or autism

4



## ORAL HEALTH

Address the backlog for tooth extractions in hospital for under 10s

5



## MENTAL HEALTH

Improve access rates to children and young people's mental health services for 0-17 year olds, for certain ethnic groups, age, gender and deprivation

# Health Inequalities Funding



## **Allocating funds:**

- Received proposals from partners totalling £700k – oversubscribed
- Set criteria based on the health inequalities we have in York and our strategic aims
- Small number of partners from VCS, NHS and Public Health met to discuss allocation of funds – agreed a strong set of proposals which will help to meet the needs of our population
- Proposals went to York Health and Care Partnership Executive Committee and were agreed – currently going through the ICBs population health and prevention executive committee but are agreed in principle

## **Monitoring outcomes:**

- Work with bid leads to understand how we can best monitor outcomes for each scheme – demonstrate impact, grow the evidence base for health inequalities work
- Understand how the proposals have supported delivery of the Partnerships priorities and the HWB strategy
- Embed learning for the future
- Work with ICB to understand process for future funding – can we be more strategic in how we think about prevention and health inequalities funding
